Highlights in 2010-11



Priority 1 – Moorlands



- Launch of Moorland Landscape Partnership
- Supported review of MIRE phase 1 and preparation for phase 2
- Well attended moorland management seminar in December 2010
- Liaison with Natural England over swaling plans
- Sustainable Development Fund grant pot of £20,000
- All approved burns achieved and impact study commenced





Priority 2 - Support for livestock farming

- Evidence provided to the EFRA Select Committee uplands inquiry
- Hosting visit of Defra official drafting Defra uplands policy
- Livestock market completed





Priority 3 – First class rights of way network



- 93% of PRoW met ease of use criteria
- 10 major works projects completed to improve PROW condition.
- 19 locations where the public right of way was reinstated on the definitive line.







Priority 4 – Young people and non-traditional audiences

- 2,622 people engaged through Pinkery Education Centre, including:
 - 36 Schools (1,536 participants) residential
 - 20 YHA groups (524 participants) residential
 - Camping use (124 participants)
 - Day users (156 participants)
 - Perambulation (282 participants)
- Education Service delivered:
 - 81 events involving 813 young people from Exmoor National Park schools and 1,578 young people from the greater Exmoor area





Priority 4 – Young people and non-traditional audiences

- 2,035 volunteer days completed by the Exmoor Conservation Volunteer Partnership.
- The 'Mosaic' Project supported 21 events involving 322 people from BME communities and 'hard to reach' young people







<u>Priority 5 – Commence a strategy for the National Park to become carbon-neutral by 2025</u>

Some achievements:

 Implementation of Low Carbon Communities Challenge programme worth £400,000 and funded by Department of Energy & Climate Change (DECC)









Priority 6 – Improving prospects for young people

- Moorland Landscape Partnership funding will help support 3 apprenticeships for 18 months and 3 'Moorkeepers'
- 10 students developing moor skills
- West Somerset Community College rural skills unit





Priority 7 – More affordable housing

- 20 new affordable homes were granted planning permission
- 12 new affordable homes at Barnes Close Mead, Dulverton received confirmation of funding from the Homes & Communities Agency (HCA).







<u>Priority 8 – Tourism development</u>

- ExploreMoor website












Priority 9 – Review of local planning policies

Some achievements:


 Feedback reports produced for all of the 21 local public consultations on the new Local Development Framework (LDF) which were attended by 958 local residents.







- Over 6,800 customer contacts by the planning team, 295 planning applications determined over the year with 68% of minor applications (target 70%) and 84% of other applications (target 80%) determined within 8 weeks.
- Increase in Community & Parish Forum meetings
- Governance review
- 2 editions of Park Life
- Residents Survey



Spending review



- Externalised legal services and historic buildings advice
- Reduced core staff by 14 posts (9.6 FTE) on an establishment of 91 (79 FTE) by 31st March (=12% capacity)
- Restructuring around key communities
- Reviewing National Park Management Plan and Authority priorities in next 12 months
